Task

2. 'There is no life after death'. Evaluate the statement. (12 marks)

You should include different, supported points of view and a personal viewpoint. You must refer to Christianity in your answer.

Your work must tick the following boxes:

- Introduction*
- Clear statement of your point*
- Evidence to support your point*
- Explanation of evidence to support your point*
- Counter-attack of your argument.*

Note: develop two key points (for and against the statement), and analyse the strength and weaknesses of each argument). You must arrive at a reasoned personal conclusion.
